Blister pack Re-cycling

Blister Packs, used for tablets contain a mix of aluminium foil and plastic and cannot be recycled in your recycling bin at home.

However, they can be recycled, and Mid-Suffolk District Council is trialling a project with a recycling provider to test the viability of the service.

Trustees have had a few questions about the service which has

delayed the placing of the recycling container, and we are aware that some of you already have some packs and have tried to drop them off.

The recycling container will be inside the Community Centre for residents to drop off their used blister packs. However, we have decided that, as the Centre is not always open, we will position a box (like a post box) on the outside wall to the left of the main entrance, marked FOR EMPTY BLISTER PACKS ONLY, and it will be regularly emptied into the main container, so that you can drop off your packs even when the building is locked.

We hope that this trial will be successful.

Nature Notes

The natural world is in trouble - not just in Palgrave or the UK but globally, as we all know only too well - and we are constantly reminded of such perils as climate change and species depletion. It can all get too depressing. But not all is bad news – there is always something cheering to be found in nature, if only we are prepared to look and take pleasure in what is still out there. This was my thought as I read an article in the British Wildlife magazine about the problems facing the Lesser Spotted Woodpecker (LSW), a once common British species that has now seriously declined after an early surge in numbers in the 1960s and '70s with the resurgence of Dutch Elm Disease. So, let's celebrate the LSW and its family.

The woodpeckers (the Picidae) are certainly one of the more easily recognised bird families in Britain. We have just four species, three of which can perhaps be seen here in Palgrave if you are very lucky, but realistically there are now just two, both currently classed as 'fairly abundant'. Parts of mainland Europe, however, are apparently home to eleven species, two of which are now extending their ranges north-westwards and may well become permanent residents here in time – the Black Woodpecker and the Middle Spotted Wood. If it does so the Black will become our largest 'pecker by some margin, being almost a third larger than its familiar Green cousin; the Middle Spotted Wood, as its name suggests, is smaller than our Greater Spotted but with a heavier bill, and both sexes having a red crown, absent on the familiar GSW except when the latter is still in juvenile plumage.

In Palgrave the most frequently seen and heard 'pecker seems now to be the Green Woodpecker, though hitherto this has not always been the case. In recent years the most likely place to spot one was the western end of Wortham Ling, but that is no longer almost exclusively so. Presumably the reason is an apparent upsurge in ant populations, for despite the well-publicised dearth of insects generally, these tenacious little creatures can be found in open countryside almost anywhere but mostly in grassland on sandy soils, as on The Ling. Ants are the main (preferred?) food for a Green Wood (a birder's abbreviation) and is very often seen on the ground, though in winter it is more likely to be found in any isolated mixed copse. The plumage makes it an unmistakable sighting: green upperparts, much paler beneath and, particularly the male, a bright yellow rump (visible only while in its typical woodpecker's undulating flight). Both sexes sport a red crown with black around the base of the bill and a pale yellow eye; both have a prominent stripe below the eye, red and black in the male, black only for the female. The juvenile bird is patterned similarly but heavily spotted and generally duller. More common in Palgrave than in the last century, but more often heard than seen, the Green Wood's strident 'laughing' call is now very familiar around the village. A handsome, noisy bird, but often rather shy.

The prize sighting amongst the woodpecker family in this country is undoubtedly the Wryneck, a small, unobtrusive brown bird with prominent lateral black lines on neck and back. Common enough in the nineteenth century but now officially extinct as a British breeding species, it's still recorded somewhere in the country in most summers (being migrants they overwinter south of the Sahara). It is not easily seen anywhere, but if you're keen to add to your life list it is likely to be encountered searching for ants in open grassland or heath like The Ling, a trademark woodpecker pursuit.

One of the most hopeful natural sounds heralding the onset of spring is the drumming of a woodpecker. This will almost certainly be a Great Spotted (GSW), one of our two pied (black & white) woodpeckers, easily recognised by size as well as its colour patterning. Almost as big as its green cousin, it is black with large white ovals and extensive white bars on its head and wings; it has a deep red vent often extending onto the white belly, but only the adult male has a red patch behind the crown. Census results show that there are currently more pairs of GSW than of the Green. for, despite the more impressive colouring of the latter and its preference for an open grassland habitat, the Great Spotted is more secretive and less obvious in its preferred habitat, the tree canopy. As for the drumming, which is exclusive to late winter and spring, the GSW drums more frequently and audibly: both sexes drum in short bursts (about 0.5 to 0.8 seconds' duration) but at an almost incredibly fast rate (thought to be 15-20 strikes or more per second) on a tree trunk or branch, which acts as a sounding board. The purpose is probably just to attract a mate. It is now realised that the sound is made simply by banging the beak on wood, rather than produced vocally as once thought. So why does this not damage the bird's brain, or at least give it a severe headache? The answer is the shock absorbent pad between the base of the bill and the skull, a successful evolutionary adaptation that may also be why they always nest in their own hole excavated in soft wood, perhaps birch or conifers in preference to the much harder oak, rather than using one ready-made and stolen from another resident.

And so to our fourth and final UK woodpecker, the Lesser Spotted. Currently the LSW is red-listed as a 'species of serious conservation concern' with an estimated UK population put at 1750-2300 pairs, 'a decrease of 91% between 1967 and 2022' and 'a range contraction of 41%' (Smith & Smith, BW 36-2). It's confined to southern Britain. A tiny woodpecker the size of a sparrow, this is a bird with a preference for open, wet deciduous woodland that includes a range of tree species, of which a number will be dead and decaying. Old orchard trees were popular in the last century for nest sites, but for some reason not entirely understood they are now rarely used (but of course few old orchards remain). The LSW itself looks very similar to its much larger cousin: black and more heavily barred, the male sports a red crown but no red nape or vent, whilst the female is entirely black and white. However, size difference alone makes any confusion most unlikely. The reasons for the spectacular decline of this little bird are still largely just speculation but now subject to intense research. So far this has shown that a lack of breeding success is a major factor, many nestlings failing to survive their first few days after hatching, especially in a wet spring. I do hope that things soon improve for Lesser Spots as I have to admit to a particular liking for them: since my early birding years I have watched their increase in the wake of the Dutch Elm disaster followed by an agonising, slow decline ever since. They are a great little bird to watch.

Question of the month to the Team at Botesdale Health Centre (BHC):

Q: After having an appointment at Botesdale Health Centre, could you please explain the process for picking up a prescription issued during a consultation?

A: After your appointment, please go to the dispensary counter and inform the staff that you are waiting for a prescription. You do not need to join the queue, once you have given your name to the counter assistant, please take a seat on either the chairs in the foyer or on the bench seats in the waiting room. Then, please wait for the prescription to be dispensed. The dispensary team will call your name when your prescription is ready.

Enoy the outdoors this spring and summer but be tick aware

Ticks can cause infections such as Lyme disease or tick borne encephalitis. **Being tick aware** by using the following information can help to reduce the chance of tick bites and of being infected.

Avoiding ticks

- walk on clearly defined paths, to avoid brushing against vegetation where ticks may be present
- use an insect repellent (for example DEET) that can repel ticks and prevent them from climbing onto clothing or attaching to skin (always follow the manufacturer's guidance)
- wear light-coloured clothing so that ticks crawling on clothing can be spotted and brushed off immediately
- wear long trousers and long-sleeved tops to reduce the direct exposure of ticks to your skin, making it
 more difficult for them to find a suitable area to attach
- regularly checking clothing and exposed skin for ticks that might be crawling on you and brushing them off immediately

Carry out a tick check

- after participating in outdoor activities (for example, walking, running, gardening, camping, picnicking, orienteering) always carry out a thorough tick check. A tick check is carried out by looking and feeling for ticks that may have attached to the skin. By performing a tick check, the chance of infection is reduced because feeding ticks are spotted and removed promptly.
- ticks can bite anywhere on the body, including in your hair. More than one tick can be attached to you
 at a time

If you have been bitten

- remove ticks as soon as possible
- the safest way to remove a tick is to use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers or a tick removal tool
- grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull upwards slowly and firmly, as mouthparts left in the skin can cause a local infection
- clean the bite area with antibacterial wash/soap and water, and monitor it for several weeks for any changes
- contact your GP or 111 promptly if you begin to feel unwell with flu-like symptoms or develop a spreading circular red rash (which usually appears within 1 to 4 weeks after being bitten). Remember to tell them you were bitten by a tick or have recently spent time outdoors.

A word from Rosedale.....



Here at Rosedale, when we run our bereavement support groups, week three can be quite a difficult week for participants. We ask them to bring in a photograph of their loved one and talk for about five to ten minutes about them. Most people feel trepidation about doing this as they worry they will get upset or freeze. For some, even bringing in a photograph is a major milestone as they may not have been able to look at photos since their bereavement.

Just for this week, we ask that participants focus on the life of their loved one, rather than their illness or the circumstances of their death. In this way, we are trying to see the big picture and understand that their death is a small part of who they are and the full life they have lived. Everyone is different but being with someone as they died can be a mixed blessing. We may feel grateful we were with them as they passed away but also be traumatised by the experience. Some find that their mind keeps replaying unpleasant memories they would rather forget. Sharing photographs is about reframing what has happened and putting their death into the much bigger context of their life.

In reality, as is true with so many things, the build-up and anticipation is usually worse than doing the thing itself. As they recall how they met, special moments, holidays or their funny quirks, there are often tears and usually lots of laughter. Almost without exception, most participants find that talking about their loved one's life offers a therapeutic release and an opportunity to recall and appreciate the happy times they shared. As facilitators, It is always lovely to see the group members bonding together as they reach a deeper level of empathy.

Memories can be bittersweet and we may get upset, but crying is a normal response to grief. Our loved ones will always be part of us. We are the person we are today, partly because of them. They live on in us.

Talking to others who are also grieving can be very supportive. Rosedale's groups are free and open to everyone. Call 01379 640 810 to reserve your place.



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
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
