EDITORIAL

On the whole people have been quite complimentary about 'The Palgrave Star'. It came as a response to a need and although obvinusly it does entail a certain amount of work we do seem to meet our deadlines. The problem is that we cannot operate unless you co-operate. It is not our intention to use the community newsheet in order to propogate our personal views and interests. All we are supposed to be is a sounding board, a vehicle for the organisations and individuals to inform, discuss, query and entertain one another. In our first issue we drew attention to the number of village organisations but since then virtually none have contacted us. Certain individuals have responded splendidly to requests for articles and we are very grateful but again this could leave us open to criticism of 'doctoring the news'. We understand that the village organisations are not secret societies, that they have interesting programmes, stimulating speakers and possibly would appreciate increased member-We also know that individuals have stimulating, provocative views. a lot of interest in 'improving village communications' about the time of the controversial cutting down of the trees on Palgrave Green but since that time, again interest has waned. An example of this was that not a single member of the public attended the last Parish Council Meeting at Palgrave. It is disappointing to have the means to speak to one another but to find that we have so little to say.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Due to the foresight of the Playing Field Committee at the time, the present playing field was purchased for the use of the village and it has proved a wonderful investment. It is managed by the present Committee who meet at intervals to deal with any business outstanding. The Committee has very little in the way of

financial resources and when the County
Council Education Department offered to
keep the grass cut on the entire field in
exchange for the full use of the area by
schoolchildren for organised games during
school hours, a very heavy burden was lifted
from the Committee, because cutting the field
by a private contractor could cost up to
£40 a time and at least three cuts a year
are necessary. It must be immediately
obvious that the Committee would not be
able to meet this kind of expense and the
consequence would be that the field would
rapidly deteriorate.

We come now to the point of this article. The workmen of the County Council who cut the grass have delivered an ultimatum. Unless steps are taken to stop the fouling of the whole field by defecating dogs, no further cutting will be carried out by the County Council and thus the entire burden will fall on the Playing Field Committee. It will therefore be seen that strong measures are needed to deal with the situation and as from the publication of this article in the December 'Star' a ban will be placed on the use of the Playing Field for exercising dogs.

It is to be hoped that everyone will realise that apart from the financial aspect, another important factor is the persistent fouling of an area which is used constantly by children and who are put at considerable health risk by the excretia of dogs quite apart from the unpleasant effects of the stuff on shoes and clothing.

The Playing Field Committee hope that the ban will not be considered anti-social and that all concerned will appreciate the situation and act accordingly.

STUSTON PARISH COUNCIL

Stuston Parish Council, now up to full strength following the recent co-option of Mr George Hull, met on 10 November. Aspects of rural policing were discussed with PC G Pettitt who had been invited to the meeting. The Parish Council also learnt that the County Council's Highway Committee had noted the petition signed by parishioners in opposition to the proposed alternative route for holiday traffic along the Old Bury Road. It had been agreed that the traffic situation along the road would be monitored in response to the Parish Council's suggestion that it was unsuitable for heavy traffic. The Parish Council agreed to suggest that chevron warning signs be provided on the bend on the Green, as there had been an accident in this vicinity the week previously. Damage to the road surface and verges caused by heavy lorries pulling up at the phone box was also to be reported. The Parish Council in response to a request for suggestions to achieve economies in local government spending, condemned Mid-Suffolk District Council's proposal to build Central Offices at Needham Market (thus closing the Eye offices) as "an extravagant prestige exercise". Various other matters were dealt with during the meeting under the chairmanship of Jimmy Laurie. It is hoped that reports of future meetings can be available for inclusion in 'The Star'. The Parish Council are interested to hear of any matters raised by parishioners.

I REMEMBER

I remember - the middle reaches of the Lowes, the majestic oak which dominated the eastern side and the clumps of silver birch which filtered the westering sun. The golden gorse with linnets nesting and singing their happiness, wild flowers in their season and always rabbits, so tame small children could almost catch them and none of that devilish introduction, myxamatosis, to leave rotting corpses to be passed by on the other side.

I remember - the pond near the village school in winter a scene from a Dickens novel. Laughing children muffled against the cold and running in long lines to keep the pot a'boiling as they slid over the ice on their hob-nailed boots. In Summer the dragonflies hovering in blue-green translucence over flowering water plants. The sheer delight at watching Charlie Coleman drive his horse-drawn water cart into the middle of the pond and with much splashing and commotion fill the cart to the brim and take it, lurching and spilling on the dusty road to water his thirsty cattle.

I remember - drainage ditches alongside fields and meadows, busy communities of our wildlife where sweet spring water flowed, unsullied by chemicals and where weary schoolboys slaked their thirst on their walks to and from school and gathered watercress for the family tea.

I remember - roadside hedges of thorn and other plants, nesting sites of so many birds, haunt of the hedgehog and where autumn's bounty of ripe berries were natures larder for the birds.

I remember - the willow fringed pond by the Old Bury Road where small boys fished for minnows with worms on bent pins and the king-fisher mocked their efforts as he flew to his bankside nest with a beak full of wriggling stickleback.

I remember - the wide grassy verges of Millway Lane, covered in Spring with sweet violets and

primroses and, successively through the Summer abounding with many flowers of English country lanes, which closed the season with scented thyme and blue butterflies hovering in the lowering sun.

I remember - much, much more, but let me finish by sounding a note of warning. The things I remembered - where are they now? Gone for even victims of mans' grand design for Nature which says in effect "What one generation enjoyed, the next one certainly won't"! To all who are rightly concerned at this situation the message is clear. Do something positive about it - join a society that is dedicated to preserve, to fight for cherished ideals and to promote nature reserves for our fast diminishing heritage.

I am not motivated by sloppy, sentimental nostalgia but by a desire to warn that other natural delights will be threatened and watchfulness and action will be needed to preserve them.
