PALGRAVE PARISH MEETING

The thirty-five members of the public who attended the Parish meeting on 12 May presumably came as a result of the strong feelings expressed in the local press recently regarding the felling of trees on the green. The Parish Council were practically at full strength with Mr B. Horstead, Chief Planning Officer of Mid-Suffolk District Council, Mr McGregor, County Councillor and Mr Wassell the Tree Preservation Officer attending to give background information where necessary.

The stage was set and as the Chairman, Mr Leeder, and Vice-Chairman, Canon Rogers, were elected there was an unusual atmosphere of anticipation. The Chairman made adjustments to the Agenda to allow for the main item to be dealt with first and after the Clerk had pointed out that the Parish Meeting chaired by Mr Goater was technically not valid A possibly difficult situation was diffused by several residents who said that they wanted to put the other side of the publicised story. They for the first time had light in their homes and a view across the green and were thankful that the trees had gone. parishioner wanted to record his support for the Parish Council and roundly condemned what he considered irresponsible letters that had been printed in the Diss Express. It appeared that the majority of the houses south of the Post Office disapproved of the criticism of the Parish Council. Mr Goater strongly emphasised that in calling the "unofficial" meeting he had not intended criticism of the Council but he was seeking an explanation for the unexpected felling. It was pointed out that The Palorave Star was intended to help improve the communications between all organisations and villagers.

Mr Horstead explained, for the Electricity Board, that funds were not available to put wires underground or move posts but this did not satisfy one resident who laid the blame completely at the door of the District Council with the local council tacitly complying. This suggestion was countered by another parishioner who emphasised the difficulty of finding a sufficient number of people willing to work on the Parish Council and he felt criticism was not at all justified.

Mr Horstead explained the wide powers of the Electricity Board and the points to be taken into account when the District Council drew up a scheme of management for Palgrave Village Green's trees. This included the health of the trees, the spread of the roots, the blocking of sunlight, the overall visual effect and the sighting of new trees.

The trees outside the Post Office were discussed and a plea for their retention was very strongly made by Mr Cartwright. A wider concern was also expressed about the destruction of the surrounding countryside with trees being felled, ditches filled in and grass verges ploughed up. Millway Lane was specially mentioned. The Council replied that it had been concerned about this for several years and it welcomed support from the village.

The discussion widened to include the reference that a group of volunteers from the Conservation Corps will be working in the district doing some essential work on footpaths and in the Churchyard. This will be financed by the Parish Council and Community Council along with some generous personal donations from villagers.

The meeting unanimously agreed to press again for a speed restriction on the Al43 and asked for road signs on the Crossing Road junction with the Old Bury Road. Having allowed ample time for discussion, the Chairman thanked Mr Horstead, Mr McGregor and Mr Wassell for attending at such short notice.

Space does not allow for a more detailed report on this important meeting but the Parish Council welcome the obvious increase in interest and hope that communications in Palgrave can be improved for the benefit of all. The Chairman, Clerk or any Councillors will be pleased to answer any queries that parishioners may have at any time.
