EVENING CLASSES AT PALGRAVE SCHOOL

CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF EXTRA-MURAL STUDIES. ECOLOGY AND ARCHAEOLOGY CLASSES.

It seems only yesterday that members of the Ecology and Archaeology classes were saying their goodbyes until the Autumn. Now, with this issue of "The Star" Autumn has arrived and with it the details of the 1980/81 classes.

Archaeology-commencing Monday September 22 at 7.30p.m. will continue the study in depth with Mr. Geoff Moss, our very popular tutor.

Ecology-commencing Tuesday September 23 at 7.30p.m. Twenty-one lectures on "The Use and Abuse of Natural Resources" by Miss Erica Towner B.Sc. The following is an extract from the syllabus.

Man is part of nature, and therefore, part of a delicate natural balance. For many thousands of years Man has used and misused the resources freely available to him. Stone Age man used flint and fire to destroy the great prehistoric forests of Britain. But this enabled him to farm, and so survive. The Industrial Revolution in part, resulted in the current world population explosion. It is this ever increasing population which has made the greatest demands on natural resources, whether plant and animal for food, or fuel and metals for industry.

The sadness is that these precious reserves are, and have been, wasted because no one realised that they might run out. In order to survive we must strike a balance between man and nature.

The course is for all who have an interest in the effects of man on his environment, by for example farming, whaling and mining. It will try to assess just how necessary these things are for man's survival. Alternatives to the present use of resources including the importance of conservation will be closely studied, as these will help in the future survival of man. The course will include a series of field excursions to illustrate the good and bad use of our environment.

Biography

Erica Towner studied Zoology at University College Swansea, emerging as a keen ecologist. This interest was pursued for three years at Exeter University whilst a research student in the Department of Biological Sciences. The research project involved a study of freshwater fish diseases, and their control, in the southwest of England. A move to Bristol University as a research demonstrator in Zoology, allowed her to pursue research interests in freshwater biology and ecology. Whilst in Bristol she also gave a series of lecture courses for the Department of Extra-mural Studies. Jniversity of Bristol, before moving to Cambridge, as tutor in Biology, University of Cambridge, Board of Extra-mural Studies.

ADULT LITERACY

A parish newsheet, such as The Palgrave Star, is a very good means of communication in a village....provided that you can read. If, however, you are one of the many hundreds of adults in Norfolk or Suffolk who has difficulty in reading you can only hope to learn the news another way. Writing letters, leaving notes, filling in forms and writing cheques are all commonplace activities to most of us. For those adults who cannot write or spell though, they are activities to avoid at all costs. Many adults go to a lot of trouble to conceal a literacy problem and it often takes a great deal of courage and possibly persuasion by a spouse or parent, to ask for help. Having started tuition they usually feel a great sense of relief and make rapid progress. Two of the reasons that motivate adults to ask for help are that they face embarrassment in their employment or find it difficult to help and encourage their children with school work.

The Adult Literacy Scheme started five years ago to help people such as these. It was supported by the B.B.C. and for a few years the government sponsored a central Resource Agency (A.L.R.A.) which produced materials especially suited for adults and provided help with training. For the past four years I have been employed as part-time Group Tutor for the Diss Group. Prior to that I was a volunteer tutor for a year. The Diss Group covers Diss and the surrounding villages in Norfolk and North Suffolk. Over this period some thirty students have received help, most very successfully, given by volunteer tutors working in their own home or in the students' homes. The students come from all walks of life including farmworker, housewife, company director, builder, executive, coach driver and unemployed. Their literacy problems range from being unable to read or write their own name and address to being able to read fluently but needing help with spelling. In a few cases help has been given covering a wide range of social skills including telling the time and using money. The help given depends to an extent on what the student perceives as his own particular

problems and difficulties. Although we aim to help students acquire comprehensive literacy skills it is important for the student that these have a practical basis, particularly in the early lessons. Many of the materials used are made by the volunteer tutors so that the work can be specifically geared to the needs and ability of a particular student.

Like the students, volunteer tutors also come from all walks of life - you do not need to be a qualified teacher to help with reading or writing. Training of new volunteers is given either by a course of weekly meetings in Diss or on weekend courses in Norwich. In some cases successful students have become volunteer tutors! As from September Adult Literacy in this area will be run by Mr. Alan Fitch, who will cover a much larger area than I have done. If you require help or know of somebody who wants help, or if you are interested in becoming a volunteer tutor ring Alan Fitch on N. Buckenham 786 or Thetford 5492.

SUGGESTED RECIPE FOR SEPTEMBER

APPLE & BLACKBERRY WINE

4 lbs. Apples (windfalls)

1 lb. Blackberries

4 oz. Sultanas

1 Lemon

1 Gallon Water

1 Desertspoon Yeast

Method

Mince apples (do not peel or core)
Grate lemon rind (no pith)
Squeeze juice and put in bucket with
other ingredients.
Pour over 1 gallon boiling water
When cool add yeast
